Since 1992, Essex River Cruises and Charters has offered interesting and informative narrated cruises through the unspoiled and pristine waters of the Essex River. We will have the entire boat, so it will be a great opportunity to enjoy this beautiful landscape with Village friends, old and new.

On this cruise you will fully enjoy the unspoiled charm of the area, *rain or shine*. The marsh itself is part of the Essex River estuary, an intriguing natural work in progress. Formed 15,000 years ago by melting glaciers of the last Ice Age, the marsh is a feeding ground for many species of beautiful birds and abundant wildlife. For generations it has sustained boat builders, fisherman, clammers,

Village Talk: Thinking Outside the Mailbox - Stamps and History

Wednesday, September 19, 1-2 pm, Newburyport Senior/Community Center

Learn about the history of the U.S. postal system by viewing stamps issued since 1847, plus the very first postage stamp from England.

Henry Lukas, Education Director at the Spellman Museum of Stamps and Postal History at Regis College in Weston, shares images of stamps and postal items featuring famous people and events issued over the years. Lukas will



explain the wide variety of ways mail has been delivered since colonial times. Also, you will learn about unusual items transported by the Postal Service and famous men and women who were collectors. You don't have to be a stamp collector to enjoy this talk!

Village Walking Group Steps Out

A group of Village members have been meeting all summer every Thursday at 5:30 pm for fun and a little exercise. "We walk for an hour each week," says Bill Franz, the Walking Group Leader. "Wherever we are after 30 minutes, we simply turn around and come back. We don't go fast and we don't go far, but we enjoy each other's company." Initially the group started as a test of best practices and possible problems that might occur with Village member interest groups. Bill, who also heads up the Member Care team, explained, "We wanted to explore how to identify which Village members might have common interests, how to best communicate with each other, and how to reach out to other Village members, as well as what would we do, where would we go, how often would we meet, etc. The test seems to have worked. Twelve members have expressed interest in the walking group, and people show up when they can. As the group leader, I send out a weekly email to those interested about where we will meet and walk. Pets and children are also welcome. We hope that this will be the start of other interest groups." The walkway to and from the boat has a railing. The walkway does move slightly, as docks do, but the crew is senior friendly and will help anyone who needs assistance. If you have any further accessibility questions, please call Essex River Cruises at 978-768-6981.

Snacks and drinks will be available throughout the trip, and there is a bathroom onboard. The Rivers Bend restaurant (https://riversbendessex.com) is right across from the cruise depot if you are interested in having a bite to eat before or after the cruise. Eating there is not being organized by the Village so you are on your own for reservations, etc.
